Profile of the College

The College was started in June 1964 under the name Commerce College, Shillong, as a purely private college in G. S. Road, Shillong. It was shifted to the present land and building on 1st May 1967. Temporary affiliation was granted by the Guwahati University up to B.Com (Pass Course) in 1967.

The College was closed down by the Governing Body from 1st April 1977 due to mis-management by the College Authorities, and was de-affiliated by NEHU. The services of the Principal, Teaching Staff and Office Staff were also terminated by the Governing Body.

The management of the college was taken over by the Government of Meghalaya by an Act of 1984 adopted by the Meghalaya Legislative Assembly and duly assented by the President of India on 17th November 1984.

The college was re-opened from 28th May 1986 as Shillong Commerce College, with PU Commerce classes (Class XI and XII) in the same land and building duly improved, renovated and repaired after permission for reopening was granted by NEHU authorities. Initially provisional affiliation was granted for 3 years only by the University for PU Commerce from 11th September 1987. However, the college is affiliated to the North Eastern Hill University for under graduate, B.Com (Hons.) classes. The college is now recognized by the UGC under 2F in January 1989 and under 12B in June 2003.

In the beginning the college started with a full time Principal who came on deputation from the Government of Meghalaya, 7 full time lecturers and 6 full time office staff with a strength of only 120 students for the session 1987-88. Now the college has 25 full time lecturers and 15 office staff with strength of 1150 students: 748 Degree students & 402 Higher Secondary for the session 2015-2016.

In a very short span of time the college has been able to produce students who have done remarkably well in their lives. Yet the college still needs to achieve more in terms of quality education. In this respect it is felt that the process of Assessment and Accreditation is a great opportunity to go beyond our daily routine and get involved in the extremely satisfying process of overhauling and self learning. It is hoped that something good would definitely emerge out of the assessment, which would thus create a better academic climate in the college.

The College has grown in terms of number of faculty members, students, co- curricular and extracurricular programs. We are open to students of all communities. A large proportion of our students are first generation learners in the arena of higher education. We strive tirelessly to upgrade skills and knowledge, impart values and guide our students to take their place as responsible citizens of India.

The College strives to provide holistic education to the students. The Self Study Report is a culmination of our efforts and we look forward to a rewarding interaction with the NAAC Peer Team to accredit our institution.

Vision of Shillong Commerce college is to be an accessible, responsive and inclusive college delivering excellent programmes of teaching and outreach that improve the lives and opportunities of students - primarily for the economically disadvantaged- of the state and the region as a whole.

Key points:
1. Independence Day wishes.

1. Brief introduction to the agricultural scene in India before and after Independence, stressing on the importance of a nation's sovereignty to hone its own natural resources.
2. The lecture touched upon agriculture in India before independence under the British rule and focused on the occurrences of famines during the 19th and 20th centuries, namely, the Great Famine of 1876 and the Bengal Famine of 1943. The Great Famine was due to an intense drought that resulted in crop failure in the Deccan Plateau and had an estimated 10 million casualties. The Bengal Famine was caused by a combination of natural factors, sociopolitics and callous leadership and had an estimated 3 million casualties
3. The lecture highlighted the causes behind these disasters including the role played by colonial policies. During the Great Famine of 1876, the British government in India continued to export wheat despite the woeful shortages of food within the country. The Bengal Famine of 1943 was compounded by a number of factors – the occupation of Burma by Japan from 1942 to 1945 which led to a decrease in rice imports into India, the British declined aid from the United States and Canada during this crisis situation despite Bengal being hit by a cyclone in 1943, the laissez faire policy of the British government, high taxation which left the peasantry impoverished and India's plight of being under British rule which meant it did not have the power of self-determination. All this led to disastrous consequences for India which clearly showed itself in the failure of its agriculture.
4. The lecture moved on to the period after India's independence from 1947 onwards and focused on the policy changes and new interventions by the now sovereign government of India. Although India still had droughts, there were no large-scale famines like the ones experienced under the British government. This however was not an indication of a healthy agricultural sector. On the contrary, there was a declining trend in the share of agriculture in India's GDP from the 1950s onwards until the Green Revolution.
5. The Green Revolution was launched in 1965 by the Government of India to tackle the problem of food scarcity within the country. Mention was made of Dr. Norman Ernest Borlaug, who introduced the wheat variety responsible for the Green Revolution; and M. S. Swaminathan, also known as the Father of the Green Revolution in India, and his contributions.
6. The Green Revolution had three main components namely, HYV seeds, irrigation and, fertilizers and pesticides. Major infrastructural changes were made in and around the Punjab region to make these necessary changes. Thus, India went from being a food-deficient country to a major food exporter in the world after the introduction of Green Revolution in the country. This part of the lecture was accompanied by digital representations that showed statistical evaluations of India's food production from the year 1999 to 2009, all of which showed an upward trend.
7. On the other hand, the Green Revolution also brought with it major disadvantages in the long run. Some of these were decline in arable land, low yields in the long run due to deteriorating water and soil conditions borne out of excessive irrigation, problem of salinity, an uptick in farmer suicides especially in areas that have adopted green revolution agricultural techniques etc. M. S. Swaminathan himself was one to warn about over dependence on green revolution techniques as an inadequate solution to India's food production problems. The Green Revolution ended in the year 1978. What one can deduce is that the techniques of the green revolution alone are not sustainable in the long run.
8. The lecture then moves on to discuss the agricultural scene in India in the 21st century. It focuses on three far laws passed by the Government of India in 2020, namely,
 - The Essential Commodities (Amendment) Act, 2020.
 - The Farmer's Produce Trade and Commerce (Promotion and Facilitation) Bill, 2020.

- The Farmers (Empowerment and Protection) Agreement on Price Assurance and Farm Services Bill, 2020.

- Each law was briefly discussed to determine whether they solved India's agricultural problems or potentially exacerbate them. To begin with, the Essential Commodities (Amendment) Act, 2020 has removed most food items from the Essential Commodities List which would subject such commodities to market-determined forces outside the ambit of government price regulation, and does not put a limit to stock piling of commodities for industrial stakeholders in agriculture (processing units and value chain participants) except under extenuating circumstances. The Farmer's Produce Trade and Commerce (Promotion and Facilitation) Bill, 2020 on the other hand has granted free inter-State and intra-State trade of agricultural produce, which means that the ambit of State APMCs to regulate price for the farmers' benefit using MSP would shrink considerably, again giving a free hand to market forces which has been documented to be disadvantageous to small and subsistence farmers. The Farmers (Empowerment and Protection) Agreement on Price Assurance and Farm Services Bill, 2020 encourages contract farming which in turn encourages big contracting companies to dictate what gets produced and may result in agricultural monopolies. The discussion gives the example of the case between Pepsi and the contract farmers in Gujarat who were later charged with monetary penalties to the amount of Rs. 1 Crore per farmer for illegal distribution of company seeds. It goes to show that this Bill in fact encourages a flawed system of farming that heavily favours big corporations.
- An important question is addressed at this point in the lecture which examines why the Indian government is coming up with such laws that seemingly do not benefit sustainable agriculture and the vast majority of Indian farmers. Dr. Mawroh attributes this to an outdated ideology that the Indian government is yet to evolve from. This is the mental need for 'Food Security' as opposed to the other ideology of 'Food Sovereignty'. Both these ideologies are briefly discussed with the main tenets of 'Food Security' being, increase in food quantity at a macro level and a model that does not take into account aspects like environmental footprint, farmer/people centric approach, traditional agricultural practices and so on. While the 'Food Sovereignty' ideology focuses on a people centric approach to agriculture, on quality alongside quantity, use of local knowledge systems and environmentally sustainable practices. The difference between the two ideologies is very apparent where one has its roots in overpowering nature, the other has its roots in supporting people's livelihoods sustainably.
- The next component of this lecture briefly discussed agriculture in the States of Meghalaya and Nagaland that still follow traditional food systems and what is called the Indigenous Peoples' food system. This system mainly comprises of paddy cultivation, use of forest produce, home/kitchen gardens and other local systems of food production. This multi-based food system has resulted in increased agrobiodiversity in the regions of Meghalaya and Nagaland. Government sources however show that Meghalaya still falls short of meeting adequate food supply for its people despite this multiplicity of food sources. A probable reason cited by Dr. Mawroh is the lack of proper infrastructure dedicated to agriculture such as insufficient warehouses for storage of surplus produce. However, one point that is stressed upon is the need to adopt and adapt traditional food systems with modern food systems to meet both aspects of quality and quantity with a focus on sustainability.
- The lecture concluded with a digital representation of the percentage share of GDP of the different sectors of the economy (services, agriculture, manufacturing, construction, mining) in the years 2011-2012; and how agriculture still employs about 50% of the population (the largest share in employment percentage) yet contributes less than 20% to India's GDP. What is needed therefore is a fundamental change in the way we view agriculture in this country. Political independence might have helped stop famines but there is a need for change in food ideology as well. As was put in the lecture, "Political sovereignty must be complemented by food sovereignty."

The Chairperson welcomed the esteemed person and the attendees to the online FDP laying stress on the need for teachers to rise to the occasion on enhancing the teaching learning methods and the need to adjust and develop with the changes taking place in the current education scenario as a whole. This was followed by a ‘Welcome Speech’ from Dr. Mrs. S. Sen. , Principal, Shillong Commerce College, who stressed on the need of this programme in order to bridge the gap between teaching and learning and enhance the development among faculties as a responsible citizen of the society for overall growth of teaching profession.

Session I:

Topic: **“Stress Management”**

Resource Person: Prof. Depti J. Oza, Dept of Education, M.S. University of Baroda, Vadodara, Gujarat.

The Resource Person of the session, Prof. Depti. J. Oza emphasized on the effective management of stress and how do we overcome stress and skills to reduce it. The talk also focused on the importance of managing or reducing stress in this current pandemic situation with a detailed explanation on the various types and level of stress that an individual may encounter in his or her professional or personal life. The Resource Person also highlighted on the various concept of stress and how it effects the individual behavior, She also emphasized on a positive note that stress is a part of life and we should learn how do we live, manage and overcome stress at our individual level. The discussion also emphasized on the benefits of stress and how to De Stress and the skills of being De stressed. The Resource Person also explained the effect of stress on our mental as well as physical health and explained in details the various De Stressing Techniques.

The 1st Session was concluded with the Question and Answer interaction between the Resource Person and the Participants.

Session II

Topic: **“Professional Ethic and 21st Century Teaching”**

Resource Person: Dr Berylda Buam, PGT College, Shillong

The Resource Person emphasized on the importance of Professional Ethics in the teaching profession and enhancing the efficiency of a teacher and his or her moral character. She narrated teaching as an art, a highly

skilled profession that we apply in reality. The resource person talked about the two criteria which are very basic to the teaching profession ie; To Serve and To Serve with Conscience, Understanding and Efficiency.

She pointed out that as teachers we need to render our service, in such a way that it attaches professional Ethics along with moral, value and integrity because ethics is a moral philosophy that involved systematizing. Any one should not forget that when we talk about professional ethics and its dimensions we talk about it as a Temple of Teaching Learning process. It is about rules, responsibility and respect. The professional ethics enhances personal, organizational and corporate standard of behavior. Teaching is treating learners with love, passion, commitment and professionalism. The Resource Person also emphasized that learning is a psychological process in which the teachers needs to understand the psychological needs of the students. She also pointed out that the teachers mental health is very important and we need to treat the students with love and affection, respect the value of being impartial to all the students irrespective of caste, creed, religion, sex, economic status etc. we need to see the overall development of students and establish a relationship of trust with parents or guardians for all round development of students. As teachers we need to work together in cooperation with the authorities and non teaching staff in formulation of the policies of the institution as a whole.

The Chairperson welcomed the esteemed Resource person and all the attendees stressing on the importance of online tools and modern methods in teaching and a need for such kind of programme that will create awareness and training on how to adjust and develop competence in this era where this tools are playing a vital role in overcoming and bridging the gap between teachers and students in the teaching learning process.

Session I

Topic: **“Hands On- Online Tools”**

Resource Person: Mr. Farlando Diengdoh, Asst Prof, Dept of Chemistry, St Anthony’s College, Shillong

The Resource Person talked about one of the learning management system ie; Google Classroom where we can manage the class as well as the students. He pointed out that this is the best and cheapest system that can be used. In this we have many ways to collaborate information in Google sheet, Google slides, Google forms etc. He gave a detailed explanation on how to work with Google classroom using G mail. He mentioned about G. Suite which is a work space for educational purpose. He pointed out on the easy accessibility of Google classroom that can access all class works, video lectures, notes, PDF files etc. Further he demonstrated how to create Google classroom and explained in details its various features.

Moreover he gave a detailed explanation and showed the differences between the streams and class work items and showed how to add and enroll students in the Google classroom which are of three different ways that is from class code, by sharing a hyperlink (URL) with the students or can be done manually. He also showed on how to attach PDF files and set unit category for internal assessment. He

explained the various forms to install and refresh the pages, also how to award grades to the students. Overall the session was very detailed and informative.

Session II

Topic: “***Hands On- Online Tools***”

Resource Person: Mr. Farlando Diengdoh, Asst Prof, Dept of Chemistry, St Anthony’s College, Shillong

The 2nd Session started with a question as to how we can record audio or video in a screen. He displayed some technological gadgets like a drawing tablet or drawing pen to be connected to a laptop and to be used as a Microsoft white board. When comes to the Learning Management system he demonstrated how to enroll students in moodle system with maximum number of students as 250 per class. He highlighted that in this system we can create 30 classes per day with around 200 topics and the parents and guardians can also join the class due the availability of space.

He explained that moodle is an open source started in Australia we can download it free and install in a server. However it has some limitations as well . In Moodle we can have many classrooms Flip classroom is one of them. Moodle has a specific format to enroll students which was demonstrated. Some of the important points to be noted are :

1. Moodle allows only small letters and numbers.
2. To upload a file into moodle one need to convert it as CSV.
3. To select the Students into the classroom it can be done manually only if there few students.

He demonstrated how self assessment can be done based on assignment, quizzes in a detailed manner. He also showed how to check student’s attendance, check and create grades, upload videos or to trim it.

The Resource person has tremendously contributed during the session and we learn much about the moodle system which is a complicated online methodological platform when compared to Google classroom.

The 2nd Session was concluded with the Question and Answer interaction between the Resource Person and the Participants.

The Online Faculty Development Programme was concluded with a summary of the sessions presented by different Resource Persons and Mrs. J.C. Blah ,Vice Principal Shillong Commerce College, Shillong delivered the “Vote of Thanks”.

SYNOPSIS OF THE PROGRAM

The program was designed to provide Professional training course on Tally Prime to the Final Year Students of Shillong Commerce College. The program started on the 13th of September till the 19th of October 2021. There were 172 students who had participated in the training session. The duration of the course was for 4 weeks (30 days approx) and each session was for 2 hours.

The objective of the program was to help students develop competencies and capabilities. It enables the students to learn and acquire the skills needed to hone their professional Skill. The topics that were delivered were targeted at their level and focused on their need to acquire employability in different industries.

TOPIC DESCRIPTION



ORIENTATION

This was the first day of the program. The trainer along with the team gave an orientation of the program to the students. They discussed the importance of Tally Prime and its benefits. Expectations were set along with all the other information of the program. The participants were asked to clear their doubts and get a clear picture of the objective of the course.

SELF-INTRODUCTION

The trainer took a session on self –Introduction. The importance and benefits were discussed. Tips and tricks were given to frame a professional self- introduction, followed by role plays.

Basic of Accounting

The session was based on the Accounting Concept. The trainer had discussed the definition of accounting and its importance. The different types of Accounting and their application were discussed. GAAP (Generally Accepted Accounting Principles) is the framework, rules and guidelines of the financial accounting profession with a Purpose of standardizing the accounting concepts, principles and

Procedures. The trainer explained the different accounting concepts and principles and Emphasis was given on different Accounting Terminology so as to strengthen the Knowledge of each student.

Golden Rule of Accounting

A) Real Accounts:-

- 1) Debit what comes in.
- 2) Credit what goes out.

B) Personal Accounts:-

- 1) Debit the receiver.
- 2) Credit the giver.

C) Nominal Accounts:-

- 1) Debit all expenses & Losses.
- 2) Credit all Incomes & Revenue



Fundamental of Tally Prime:

The session was based on Fundamental of Tally Prime. Besides imparting the Basic Accounting Concepts, the students are also made aware regarding the significant and applicability of Tally Prime. Tally is a financial Accounting Package which retains the flexibility of all traditional practice of manual accounting. In Tally, information can be fed as well as retrieved and all human errors can be rectified.

Accounts Master:

The trainers explained the definition, types and causes of Accounts Master. Emphasis was laid on creation of Account Group & Ledger Accounts and the related configuration options.

Inventory in Tally Prime

This session was based on inventory information. The Trainer Explained and showed in practical of how to use and manage stock details, to maintain stock items category and groups. Under Stock Inventory there are different inventory information provided by tally to maintain these details:

- 1) Stock Group
- 2) Stock Items
- 3) Stock Categories
- 4) Godowns

Voucher Entry

This session was focused on how to enter different types of voucher in Tally PRIME. The Trainer explained the different type of vouchers as well as showed how to post them in Tally.

Step to Creating a Voucher Classes:

Cost Category & Cost Centers:

This session was based on **cost centre in Tally**. Cost Centre refers to an organizational unit to which **costs** or **expenses** can be allocated during transactions while the **cost category** is used to accumulate **costs** or profit for parallel sets of **cost centers**. The Trainer explained the students both theory and Practical of how to create cost center in Tally PRIME, the steps to create cost center, cost category , cost center class, creating cost class, category summary etc. The students were given assignment to test their knowledge about the topic.

GODOWNS

As per Tally's interpretation, the word Godown it is not limited to physical godown. Companies may use it to track inventory within factory premises at various manufacturing stages or workstations.

Further, it is also required to track inventory of raw materials and semi-finished and finished products under Job work activity either in case of materials transferred on job work basis or for job work undertaken by the company.

There is a functionality in Tally's godown master to mark it as own stock of company or third party stock (i.e. material received for Job work and final product produced out of it by the company).

In this session the Students were explain both theory and practical were given to improve their skill.

Multi-Price Level:

The general **price level** is a hypothetical daily measure of overall **prices** for some set of goods and services (the consumer basket), in an economy or monetary union during a given interval (generally one day), normalized relative to some base set. In this session the Trainer showed the necessary steps required to set- up the price level of Retailers, Wholesalers and Dealers. The students were given assignment along with theories.

Budget:

The Budget is a financial around or quantitative statement prepared prior to a defined period of time of the policy to be pursued during the period for the purpose of attaining a given object. The Budget is a target in which actual achievement of individual process or department is measured. It is predetermine formalization of an enterprise's goal which itself is concrete and comprehensive statement of the enterprise objective.

In this session the Trainer explained the steps for creating Budget and at the same day the students were given problems and assignments.



Goods and Services Tax

GST is an Indirect Tax which has replaced many Indirect Taxes in India. The Goods and Services Tax Act was passed in the Parliament on 29th March 2017. The Act came into effect on 1st July 2017; Goods & Services Tax Law in India is a **comprehensive, multi-stage, destination-based tax** that is levied on every **value addition**.

In this session, the Trainer explained the applicability of GST on Tally PRIME. Besides, the students were given with different problems to practice where they have to apply GST tax rate on Tally.



Payroll Reports

This session was based on **Payroll Reports**. In **Tally Prime** you can generate the following **Payroll** related **reports**. A Pay Slip refers to a document issued to an employee, which itemizes each component of his/her earnings and deductions and the net amount paid for a given pay period.

The Trainer explained the steps of how to create payroll reports in tally and the students were asked to complete the assignment which were been entrusted upon them by the trainer.

Purchase, Sales, Purchase orders and sales orders:

This session was based on **purchase order**, **sales order**, and **job order**. In order to enable purchase order, sales order and job order processing in **Tally Prime**, we have to activate the required features in F11: Features (F2: Inventory Features).

In this session the Trainer explains both theory and practical to the students and also the students were given with various problems to practice so that they can improve their skills.

Printing:

This session was based on Printing. For printing any type of ledger voucher, tally need to print data in report format. The Trainer also explains the Cheque printing, multi accounts printing, purchase printing etc. The students were given problems to practice in tally so as they can improve their skills.



Security Control in Tally:

Security Control in Tally provides the User Accounts to be saved and secured. If we wish that nobody opens our accounts without authorization, we can assign the password at the time of company

creation. When we create the company, there is a one option ' User Security Control' Press' Yes' then it will ask the administrator Name and Password.

The main objective of the course is to give the students the chance to explore the various job opportunities tourism has to offer. The programme was attended by teachers and students of the college. The programme was chaired by Mrs. Aiona Kharmawphlang.

The Resource Person was Shri. Ian Lyngdoh who is a practitioner in tourism who has undertaken many projects to promote tourist destinations and rural hospitality, organised tourism related festivals and he also participates as a resource person in numerous tourism oriented seminars and workshops.

The programme began with the felicitation of the guest after which the Principal Dr.(Mrs.) S. Sen gave the Welcome address.

In his presentation the Resource person highlighted to the students the numerous opportunities that can be explored by them in tourism. He began by sharing with the students the important tourist destinations in Meghalaya, the tourism products in these places and the various tourism activities a tourist can take part in these destinations.

He also highlighted about the Economic contribution of Tourism. Tourism is one of the largest economic sectors. According to WTTC Travel and Tourism contributed 8.8 trillion in 2018 to global GDP, 9.9% of Global Employment (1 in 10 jobs) and 1 in 5 of all new jobs created in last 5 years, 421 million jobs by 2029. Total tourist trips are predicted to increase to 1.8 trillion by 2028.

He also talked about tourism entrepreneurship where he shared with the students the numerous tourism businesses one can indulge in tourism viz., hotels and homestays, tour packaging, tour guide, handicrafts etc.

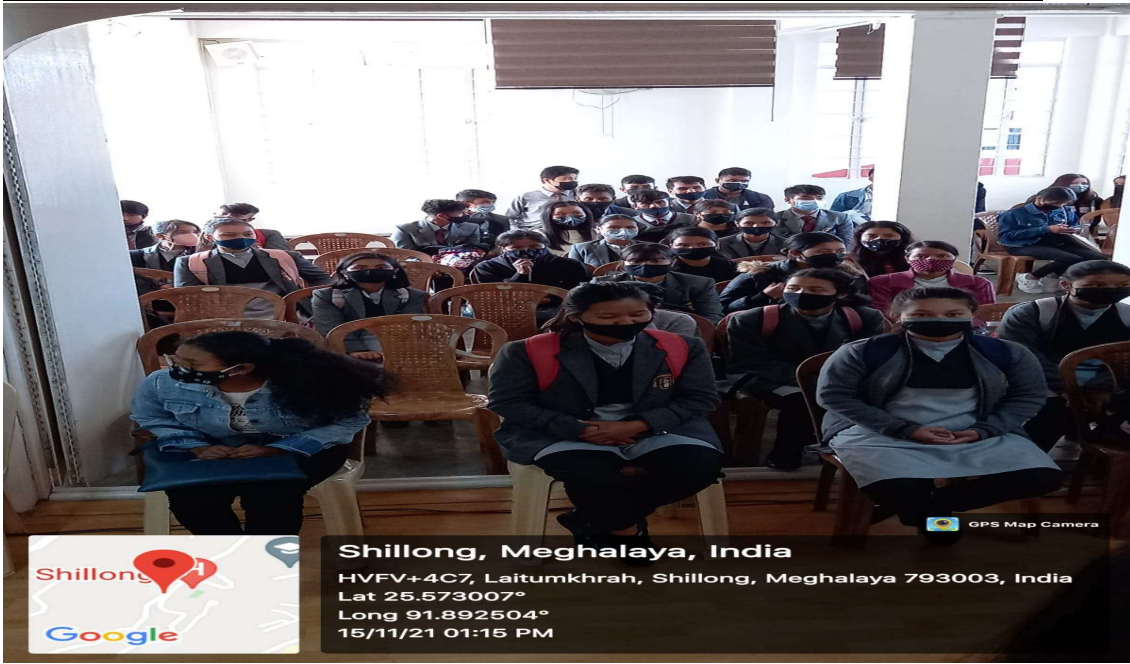

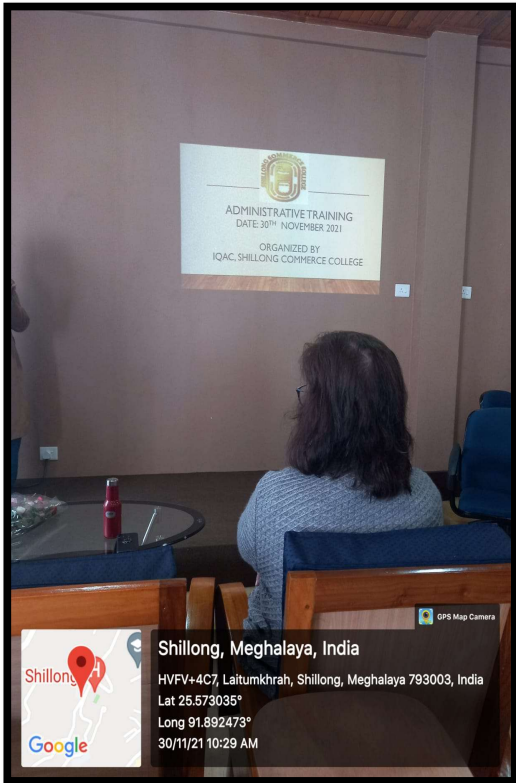
The training starts with a welcome speech by the Principal, Dr. (Mrs.) S. Sen.

Ms. Lakynti Kharpuri with her wisdom, experience and expertise in the field was surely an asset to the training thus enhancing our staff in their administrative work.

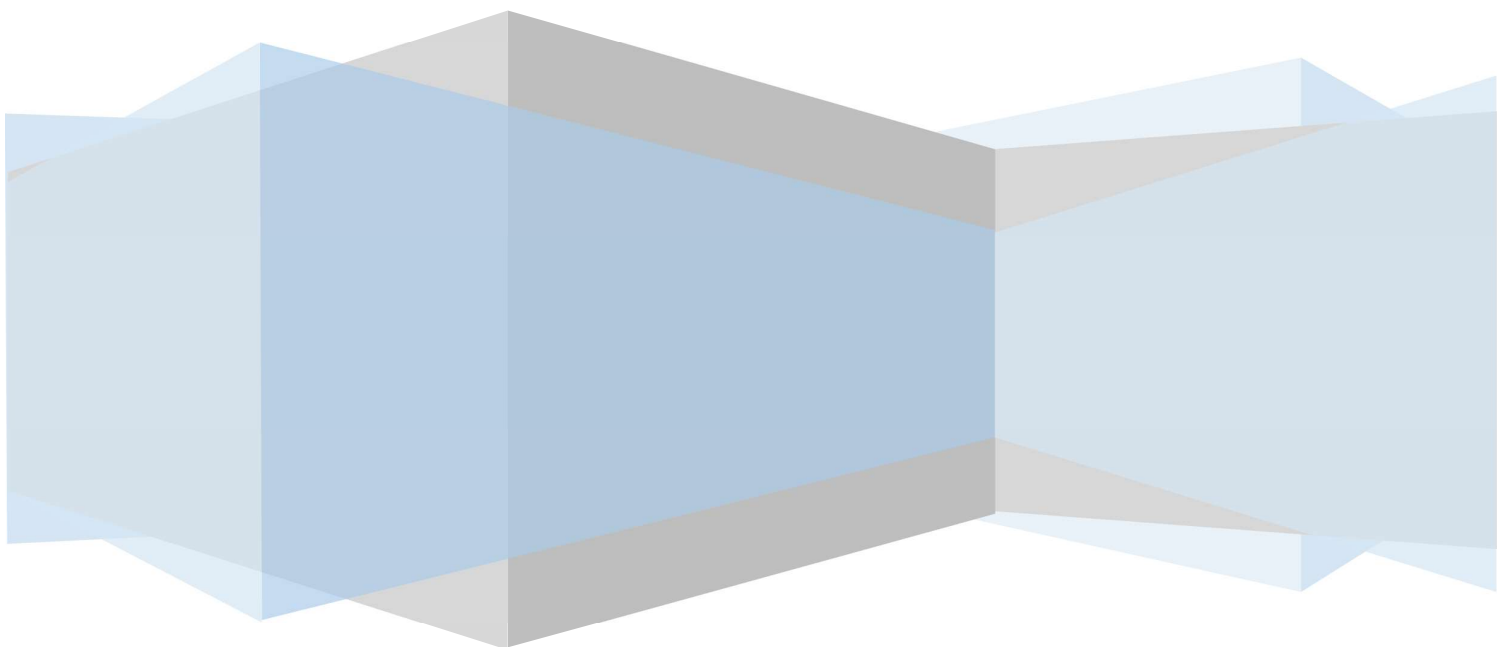

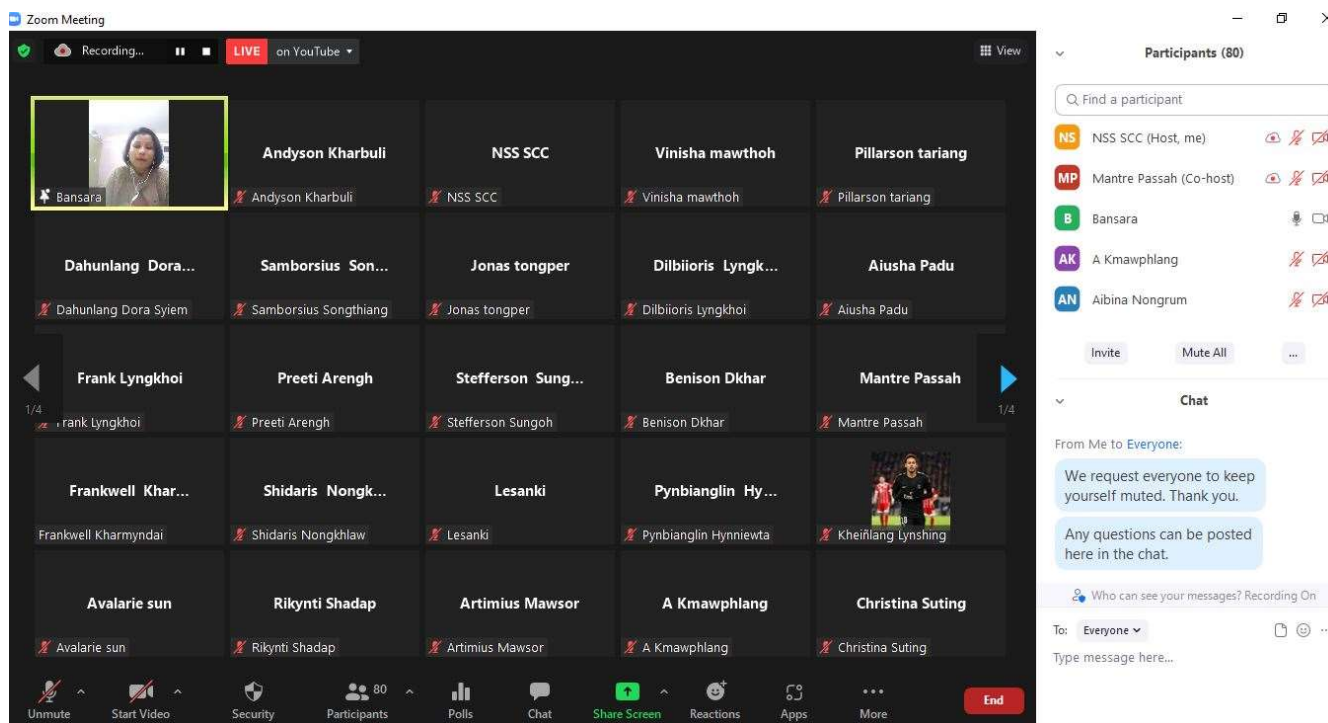

National Webinar on New Education Policy 2020

National Webinar on New Education Policy 2020: Challenges and Opportunities for Higher Education Institutions with reference to North-East India

About the College: The College was started in June 1964 under the name Commerce College, Shillong, as a purely private college in G. S. Road, Shillong. It was shifted to the present land and building on 1st May 1967. Temporary affiliation was granted by the Guwahati University up to B.Com (Pass Course) in 1967. The College was closed down by the Governing Body from 1st April 1977 due to mis-management by the College Authorities, and was de-affiliated by NEHU. The services of the Principal, Teaching Staff and Office Staff were also terminated by the Governing Body.

The management of the college was taken over by the Government of Meghalaya by an Act of 1984 adopted by the Meghalaya Legislative Assembly and duly assented by the President of India on 17th November 1984.

The college was re-opened from 28th May 1986 as Shillong Commerce College, with PU Commerce classes (Class XI and XII) in the same land and building duly improved, renovated and repaired after permission for reopening was granted by NEHU authorities. Initially provisional affiliation was granted for 3 years only by the University for PU Commerce from 11th September 1987. However, the college is affiliated to the North Eastern Hill University for under graduate, B.Com (Hons.) classes. The college is now recognized by the UGC under 2F in January 1989 and under 12B in June 2003.

In the beginning the college started with a full time Principal who came on deputation from the Government of Meghalaya, 7 full time lecturers and 6 full time office staff with a strength of only 120 students for the session 1987-88. Now the college has 25 full time lecturers and 15 office staff with strength of 1150 students: 748 Degree students & 402 Higher Secondary for the session 2015-2016.

In a very short span of time the college has been able to produce students who have done remarkably well in their lives. Yet the college still needs to achieve more in terms of quality education. In this respect it is felt that the process of Assessment and Accreditation is a great opportunity to go beyond our daily routine and get involved in the extremely satisfying process of overhauling and self learning. It is hoped that something good would definitely emerge out of the assessment, which would thus create a better academic climate in the college.

The College has grown in terms of number of faculty members, students, co-curricular and extracurricular programs. We are open to students of all communities. A large proportion of our students are first generation learners in the arena of higher education. We strive tirelessly to upgrade skills and knowledge, impart values and guide our students to take their place as responsible citizens of India.

The College strives to provide holistic education to the students. The Self Study Report is a culmination of our efforts and we look forward to a rewarding interaction with the NAAC Peer Team to accredit our institution.



- xviii) Basic requirement for fulfillment of human aspirations.

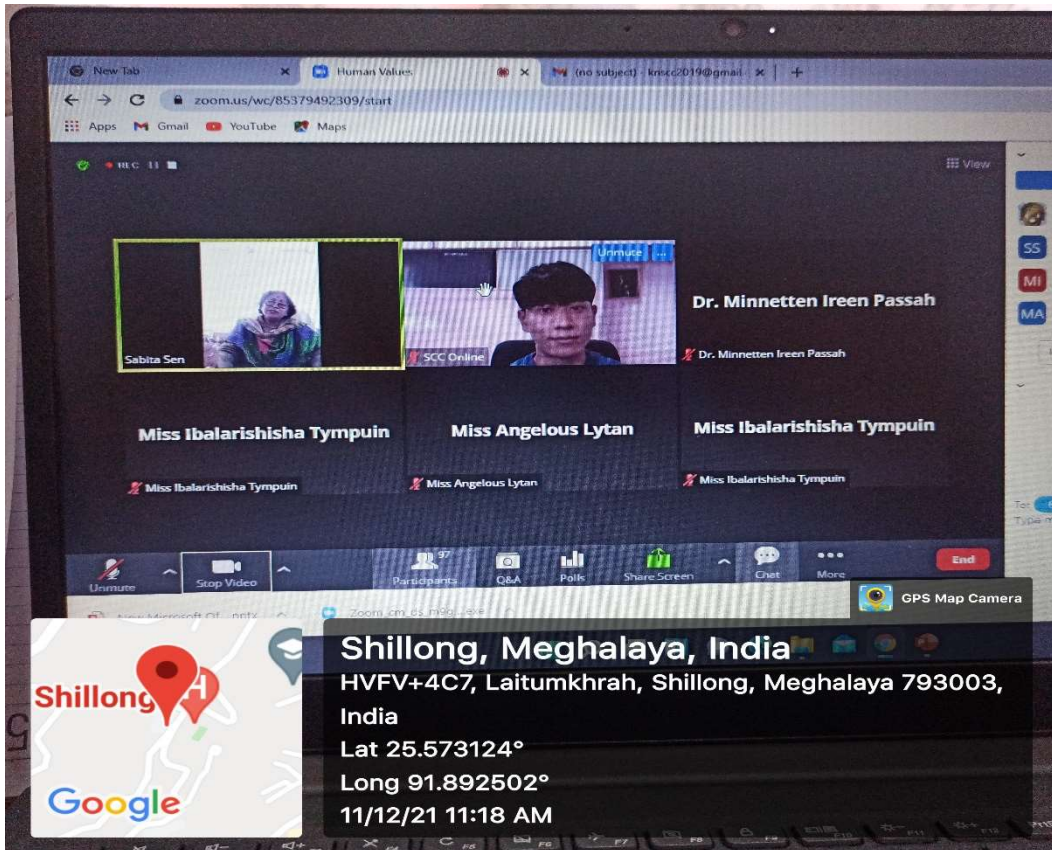

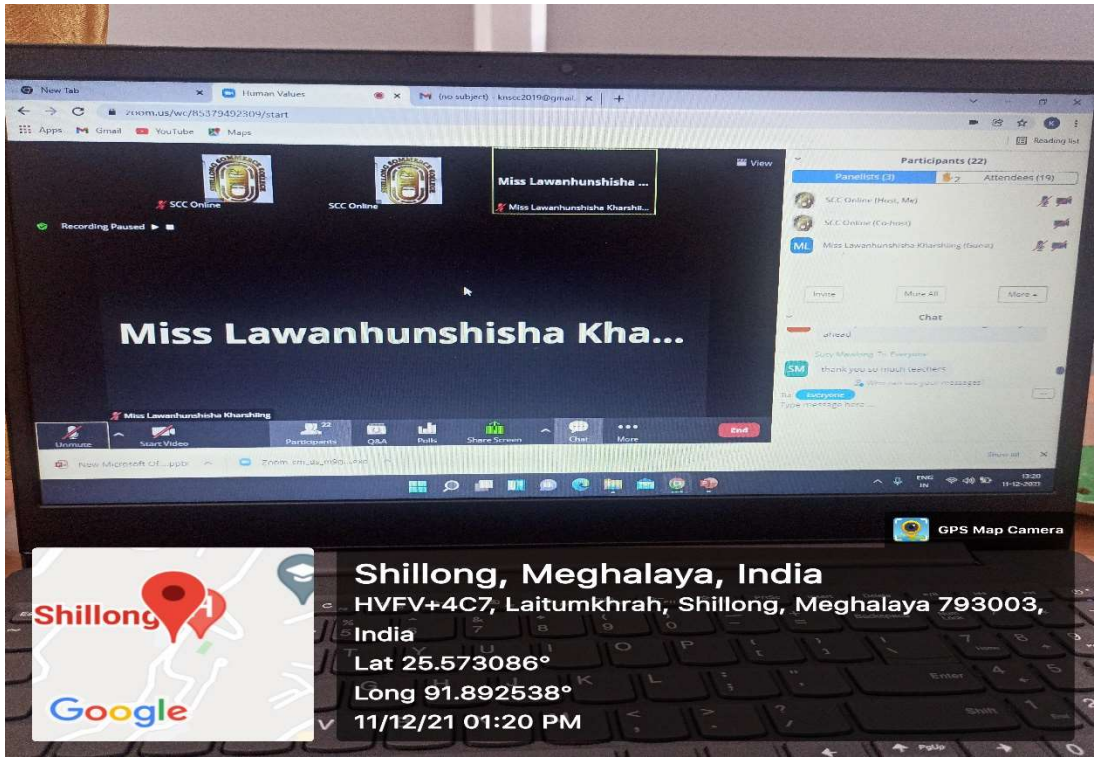

Introduction:

The Department of Sociology, Shillong Commerce College, Shillong has organized "A Talk on Gender Sensitization on the topic Women's Rights are Human Rights", which was held on Zoom platform on the 15th December 2021.

The programme was attended by the Principal, teachers and students of Shillong Commerce College, Shillong. Around 185 attended the talk.

The programme started by welcoming all the participants and the resource person by Dr. Sanbanielyne Ryndem, Coordinator and host of the programme.

A welcome address was given by Dr. Sabita Sen, Principal of the institution. Dr. Sen briefly highlighted the difference between 'Gender' and 'Sex'. She informed that in the United States there are about 52 gender whereas India only recognize the three gender i.e., Male, Female and Transgender. It is only recently that in April 2014, the Supreme Court of India declares Transgender to be the third gender.

Before handling over the time to the Resource Person, a brief introduction was made regarding her Academic Career by the Coordinator of the programme.

Important aspect of the Talk:

Dr. Rekha Shangpliang started with the Feminist movement in America when women were fighting for the suffrage rights of women. And around the late 70's and early 80's the Radical Feminist movement started and this was the time which caught the attention of gender discrimination and violence against women. And as academician this period is of interest because there was a flood of literature and it is in this period that Simone de Beauvoir said that 'one is not born but becomes a women'.

- She then talks about the meaning of Human Rights.
- She mentioned about the Universal Declaration of Human Rights (UDHR). The UDHR is a declaration adopted by the United Nations General Assembly on 10th December 1948 at Paris. Eleanor Roosevelt the widow of American President Frank Roosevelt chaired the session. It is also known as Humanity's MAGNA CARTA.

- She also mentioned about the 30 Basic Human Rights.
- She further talks about Women's Rights as Human rights. This is a common phrase used today by the Feminist movement. It was first used by the First Lady of the United States on 5th September 1995 at the United Nations Fourth World Conference at Beijing. The speech has focused on many violations against women including rape, female genital mutilation, dowry burnings and domestic violence which Clinton claimed to be human rights violations. The mostly women filled audience applauded and cheered during the 20 minutes speech. This led to a series of new legislation – the Beijing Declaration identified 12 areas including education, health, economic participation and environment in need of urgent action.
- She also talks about Human Rights violation against women. The culture of silence in which domestic violence is considered to be a private matter.
- She talks about the types of violation against women which include: drug related violence, sexual violence, dowry related violence, domestic violence, harassment at workplace, women in armed conflict situation.
- She talks about the need of the hour and suggestions for improvement which include changing the mindset of the people, women's Self Help groups and NGO's to be used as effective tools and also to give an awareness of Acts and Laws protecting women.
- She concluded her talk giving the theme for this year's International Women's Day which says- Let us "Choose to Challenge"- for which challenge comes a change to break the barriers of gender discrimination. And she also played a song that was presented in one of the UN meeting and the name of the song is ' One Women'.

Feedback form was issued to all the participants at the end of the session. The programme ended with the Vote of Thanks from Dr. Sandra Adriana Khonglah. The programme was useful and knowledgeable.

It must be noted that the Department of Sociology presented an Appreciation Certificate and Honorarium to the Resource Person. Appreciation Certificates were also given to the Organizers of the Programme.

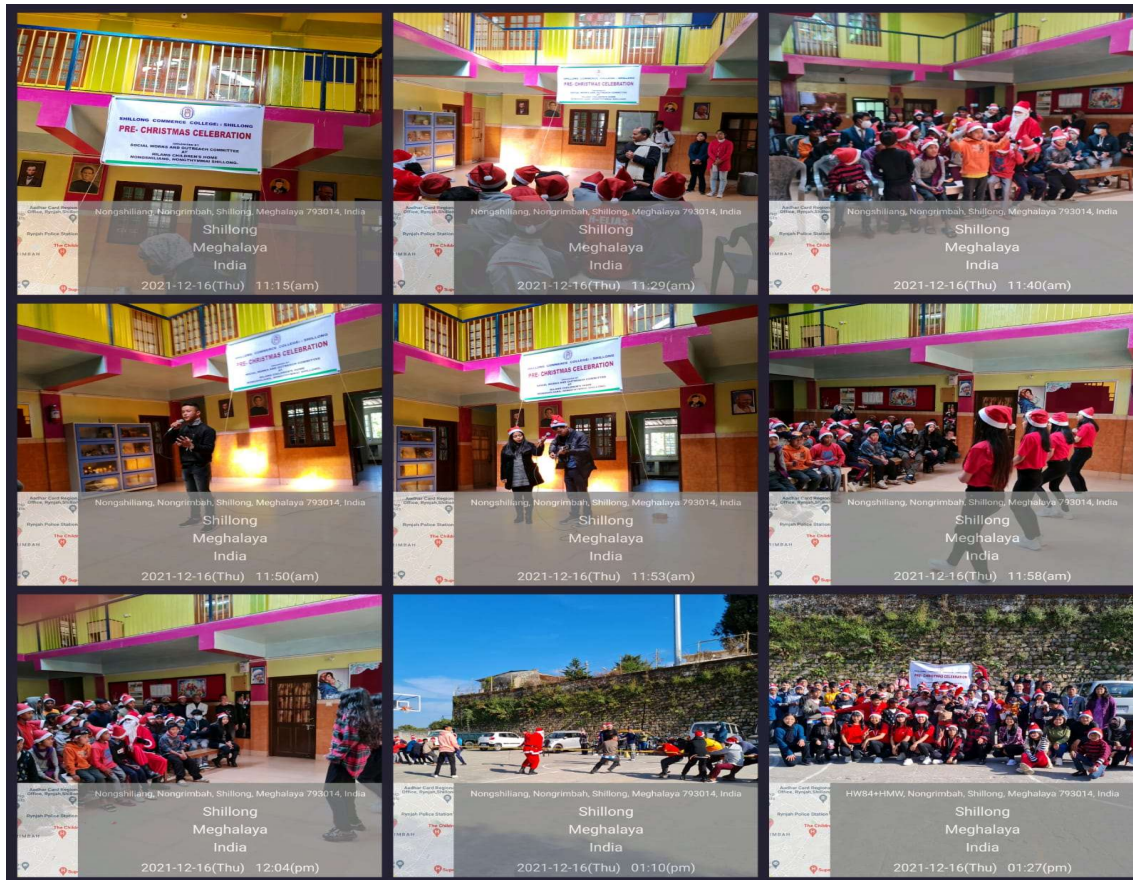

Dr. S. Khongwir, Vice Principal of Shillong Commerce College, delivered the Vote of Thanks.

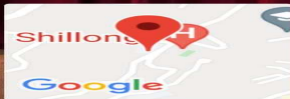

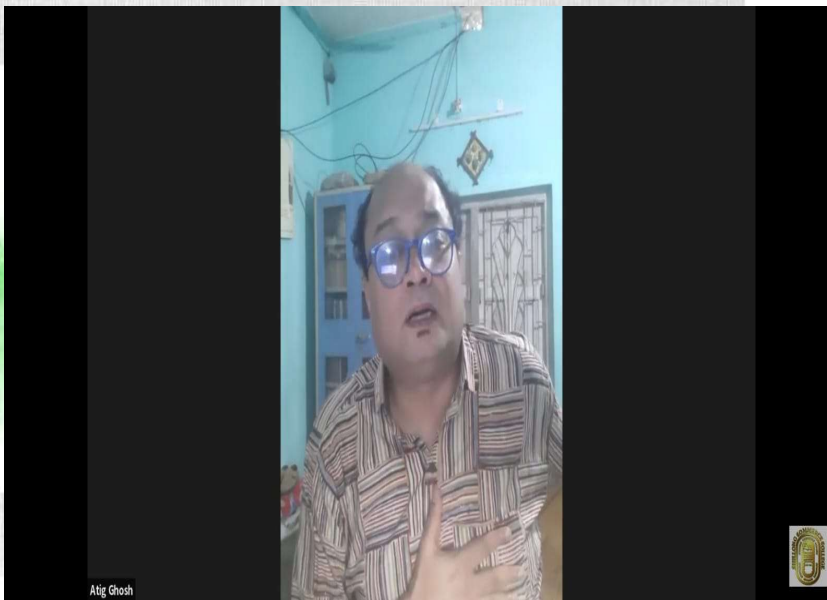

Before leaving Sheila, our final meeting was with the Secretary of Sheila. With few of the students we had a healthy discussion with him where we could gather a lot of information regarding the Organizational structure of the Village Council, the uniqueness of their culture and tradition; and the challenges faced by the people. An interesting thing is that though they live in border area yet there has been no instances of conflict.

Point of discussion:

- Leadership Role is good. They can control everything and everyone lives in peace.
- Headman takes care of the Judiciary and Legislature and Executive by the Secretary.
- He says that they plan to have a Sheila House in Shillong to meet the needs of the Sheila students studying there.
- The Village does not promote tourism in order to protect the identity of the people. So there are few tourist who visit this place.
- During Covid times the village provided its own hospital beds to the patients at their own PHCs.
- He says there is no capitalism or economic oppression in the village. Its simple economic lifestyle.



Observation during the Visit:

- Weather is hot throughout the year but in Summers it is extreme.
- Their main source of livelihood is growing beetlenut, fruits and vegetables and other eatable items.
- Market place included both the Khasi and non-Khasis.
- Most of the shopkeepers are women-both young and old. Few instance of Children selling small items.
- We see a Mixed Community like the Khasis, Bengalees residing together. Yet they share a peaceful relationship.
- There is no trading relations with Bangladesh though they live near its border.
- Property goes to all the children, but lion's share goes to the eldest daughter.
- The elders brother has responsibility both in his mother's house and in his house's wife. Thus making it a patriarchal community. Even after his marriage he can interfere into the family's property if needed.
- The market has become small in the last few years because most of the residents have moved to Shillong in search of jobs and for education.
- Market day takes place once in four days
- Mostly people are Christians but Hindus are also there.
- There are about 3100 settlers in the village.

- There is a strong Spirit of co-operation and security among the members and residents.
- The Bengalis and Garos work as tenants in the Border Areas.
- Shelia has 10 sub localities.
- Many people from Sheila comes to Shillong for education. So most of the people are educated They come back to Sheila after their Education.
- Cultural Lag is evident.
- Their Traditional dress is different from the rest of the Khasi Community.

DEPARTURE- We left the village at around 5:30 p.m. and reached around 9:00 p.m.

were the soft targets of crimes and violence. Therefore they needed to be skilled to be strong enough both physically and psychologically.

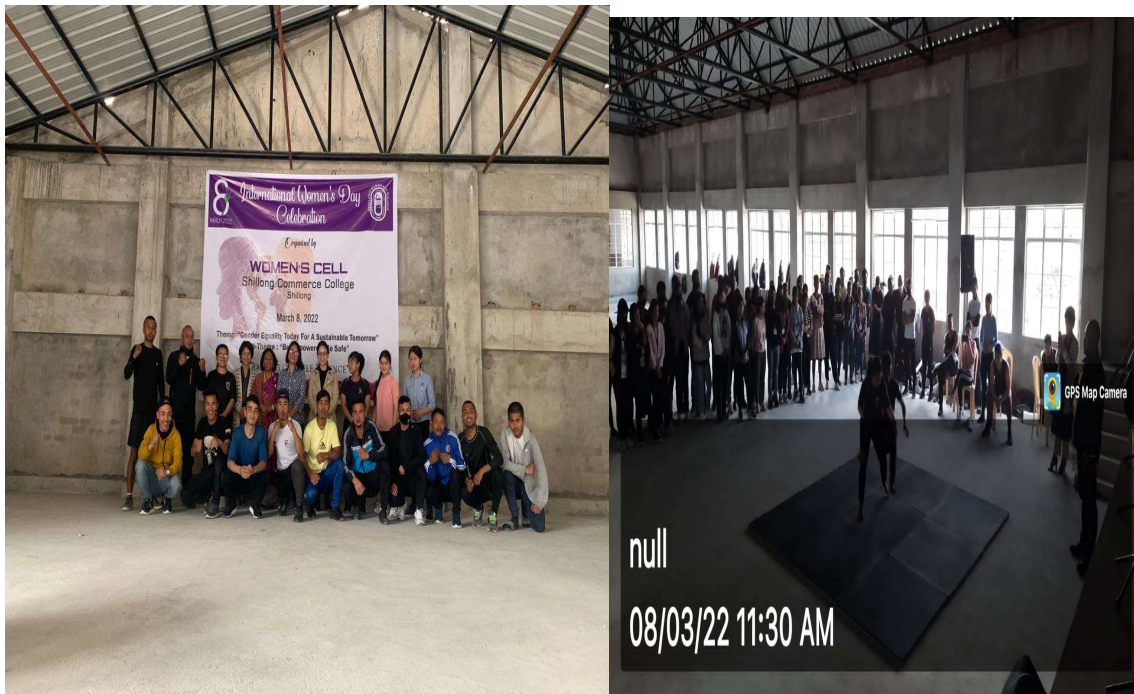

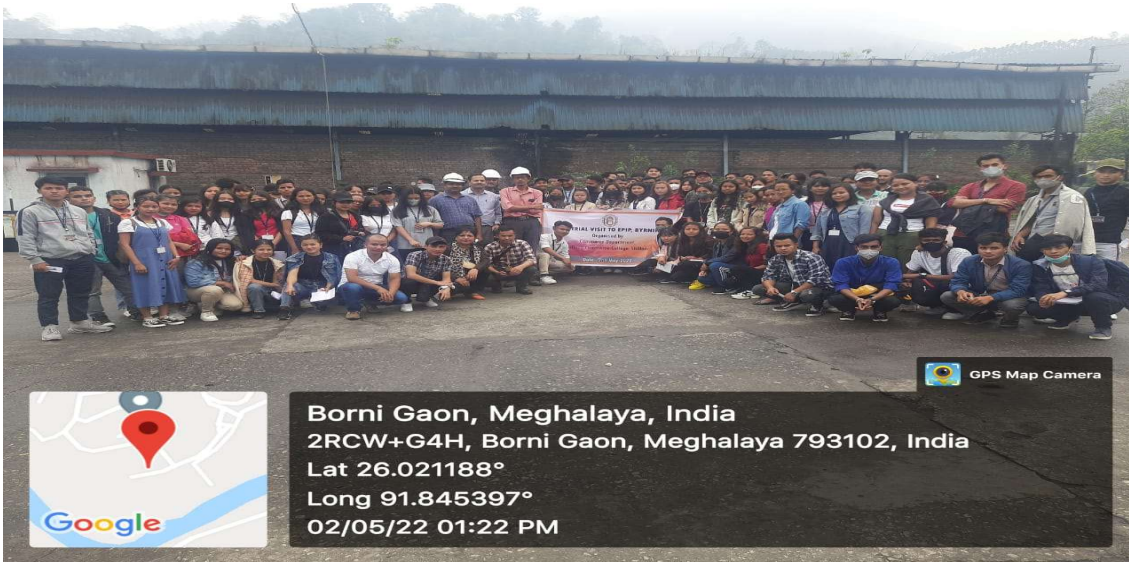
Significance:

How to go up and come down

by the rope in the long building etc.. . In addition he has explained and demonstrated various techniques relating to emergency that could occur during natural Disaster. During the training programme, students participation was encouraged and the students also took part in the entire programme.

The programme ended by both of thanks from Prof. Angelous Lytan who thanked the Director of Civil Defence and Home Guards Shillong for his help to send the team under the leadership of the Inspector and Senior Instructor Mr.S. Nongrum for giving the students and everyone present the training programme which who help everyone realize the importance of First Aid and how everyone in their own individual ability could help and safe a life.



VISIT TO JYOTI SROAT – BETHANY SOCIETY ON THE 13TH MAY 2022

The approximate need of medication for each child is Rs 200/- to 300. These children need to take medications throughout their life.

Report on Tourism Certificate Course (December 2021 – May 2022) Shillong Commerce College

Tourism is becoming more accessible to people around the world. The tourism industry has expanded, allowing individuals to capitalize on available resources to create new streams. The proposed Certificate Course aims to make aware the entrepreneurial opportunities in Tourism and Hospitality Business among Students. Besides Basic Tourism Concepts and Principles, Tourist Guide Training, Guest Relations and Etiquette we also discussed how one can start a new business in this fast-growing tourism and hospitality industry.

Although the classroom sessions were affected by the winter vacations, exams and Covid restrictions we were able to continue and complete the 3 month long course.

The sessions included Lectures, Assignments, Presentations and Interactive Sessions with Tourism practitioners, experts from Indian Institute of Travel and Tourism Management, Tourism Entrepreneurs, Hotel Owners, Tourism Organisations like Meghalaya Tourism Development Forum, pioneers of Autumn Festival, Mawlynnong, San Shnong Youth Welfare Organisation, custodians of Elephant Falls, Moolamyliang Tourism, custodian of Sacred Grove Mawphlang, Owner of Ever Living Museum, Kongor ling Sad Hima Khyrim (Shad Nongkrem Festival), Former President, Seng Khasi (Shad Suk Mynsiem Festival), and experts from Rural Tourism Development Forum.

Integrating applied Tourism to the course, the sessions included a day long field trip to Rangthylliang and Mawkyrnot villages and an interaction on Eco Tourism with the stakeholders and custodians of the Living Root Bridges. Another day long field trip to EverLiving Museum at Mawshabuit, Shillong was arranged for the students to familiarise them with Heritage and Cultural Tourism.

As part of the course, a three week session of lectures and interactions with experts on Tourism success stories, Tourism Festivals and Heritage Tourism Tourism Architecture, Guest Relations and Etiquette were organised for the students.

Further, with the objective of enhancing the communication skills of the students, there were Powerpoint Presentations on Destination Management and Itinerary Planning and a Test conducted on the same.

REPORTS FROM THE COUNSELLOR

Report on Faculty training on “How to mentor students”

The Mentoring and Value Education Cell organised a Faculty Training on “**How to mentor students**”. This workshop was conducted by the College Counsellor on 7th March 2022 at 10:30am in the Conference Hall. All faculty members of different Departments attended.

This workshop was organised to promote the importance of mentors in a student’s life and to help them grow and become the best version of themselves so that he/she can achieve his/her Personal or Career goals. The counsellor emphasized that a mentor can help introduce mentees to new ways of thinking, challenging their limiting assumptions, sharing valuable life lessons. Having a mentor is beneficial because mentors can provide knowledge and counsel to help students through their undergraduate studies. Towards the end of the workshop, prepared ***Mentoring students’ questionnaire*** were distributed to all faculty members to use during their mentoring session with their mentees.

There was a round of Q & A session.

Mentoring sessions were started by the faculty members where each of the faculty members were assigned students to mentor. At the end of mentoring sessions all mentors submitted their reports. There were many issues faced during mentoring sessions including issues such as Smoking Addiction, difficulty to concentrate while studying, financial problems, lack motivation, inability to attend classes due to space constraints in the classrooms.

As a team, we are planning to further look into these matters as to improvise more on many other issues in a practical approach.

The Convener of the Mentoring and Value Education Cell mobilised students by posting a write- up on “***Why is Mentoring important for each students***”

Counselling Report from January 2022 to October 2022 from the Counselling Department.

Throughout the year the Counsellor conducted individual counselling for student counselees of different cases such as health issues, Person with Difficulties (PWD), panic attack, fear, Anxiety, Depression, Suicidal ideation, self-harm, sexual abuse, guidance - seeking, Emotional disturbances and so on. Counselling session's records are classified into two categories "First visit Record and Follow up Record".

Counselling plans and Treatment were Cognitive Behavioural Therapy (CBT), Reality Therapy, Gestalt Therapy, information about UDID for persons with disabilities, Beck Anxiety Inventory (BAI), Beck Depression Inventory (BDI), Sentence Completion worksheets, DASS- 21, Anger Trigger worksheets etc.

In the month of February 2022, the Counsellor worked on "professional Ethics for students" to inculcate right ethical practices on the students.

In April 2022, a student from hearing impaired community was sent by the teacher for counselling. This student belonged to the hearing impaired community. This led the counsellor to further intervene on her behalf by arranging for an interpreter for this student for which she approached the executive Director of Bethany Society to arrange an interpreter for this particular student.

The counsellor could identify one student who was good with sign languages and motivated her to pursue professional courses on special Education (Autism, Learning Disabilities, Deaf and Dumb etc.)

On the 20th May, the counsellor, Miss A. Lyngdoh and the NCC students visited Bethany Society/ Jyoti Sroat School with the intention to encourage our students to become more aware of children with special needs. We also participated in their "Festival of inclusion".

On the 25th of June 2022, the counsellor along with Sir Anthony Rynjah attended a program on **International Day Against Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking** organised by Government of Meghalaya, Police Department along with the Department of Social Welfare. The dignitaries on this occasion included the Hon'ble Deputy Chief Minister Shri. Prestone Tynsong as the

Chief Guest and the Hon'ble Minister Home (Police) and Education Department Shri. Lakhmen Rymbui.

In July, the counsellor helped supervised a registered PhD scholar at the Department of Social Work, University of Delhi and she was conducting her research on ***“Mental Health Concerns of School going Adolescents: A study from East Khasi Hills District, Meghalaya”***. As a part of her study, she needed to collect data from class XI and class XII students in different schools and colleges in East Khasi Hills district for which she had completed her data collection from our institution (Shillong Commerce College).

In this year, Value Education classes on “Important manners to practice in daily life “was conducted on 9th September 2022 for classes 11 and 12 both morning and day sections. At the conclusion of the presentation, feedback forms were distributed to all the students present in the class. Most of the feedbacks were positive. Many found the presentation informative, good, some found it excellent. One student mentioned that it was a lesson to build good and healthy relationship in the future while another student expressed that it was an important topic for youths in this present day. On the scale of 10 to 100 the students rated the presentation from 60-90, and on a scale of 1 to 10 the students rated the presentation from 6 to 10. Throughout the presentation of the students were attentive and participated in the discussion that followed.

International Day Against Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking

On the 25th of June 2022, I along with Sir Anthony Rynjah attended a program on ***International Day Against Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking*** organised by Government of Meghalaya, Police Department along with the Department of Social Welfare. The dignitaries on this occasion included the Hon'ble Deputy Chief Minister Shri. Prestone Tynsong as the Chief Guest and the Hon'ble Minister Home (Police) and Education Department Shri. Lahkmen Rymbui.

The program started at 9:30am with the performance of the National Anthem by the Brass Band of Meghalaya Home Guards. This was followed by the lighting of lamps and felicitation of Dignitaries. Welcome address and Presentation of *Comprehensive Action Plan on Drug Abuse Reduction* in Meghalaya was given by Shri. Sampath Kumar IAS, Principal Secretary, Social Welfare Department Govt. of Meghalaya. This was followed by a talk by Dr Pakha Tesia MBBS,MD (Psychiatry) about the *Drug challenges from the health perspective*. He stated that drug addiction is a brain disorder. He also talked about the drug policy – three pillars

- 1.Prevention and supply reduction.
- 2.Treatment and demand reduction.
- 3.Enforcement /Legislations.

Shri. Bryan Wallang Principal Kiddies Corner Higher Secondary School, talked about *The humanitarian crises in current drug menace*. He impressed upon the need for close family ties, support and the need for quality time with the children. He also stressed upon the need for counsellors in educational institutions.

Dr L.R.Bishnoi IPS Director General of Police, Meghalaya gave a presentation of the present drug menace in Meghalaya. Due to its proximity to the 'Golden triangle' Meghalaya is considered a transit route for drugs to mainland India. He also talked about the ease of buying drugs in the different districts of Meghalaya. He mentioned about what the Police Department was doing in order to counteract the drug menace through awareness programs in educational institutions and market places, anti – drug raids in different localities and frequent checks to detect drugs.

Addresses were then given by the Smt. Rebecca V. Suchiang IAS Chief Secretary to the Govt. of Meghalaya, the Chief Guest and the Guest of Honour. A message and declaration of State Action Plan on Drug abuse by Hon'ble Chief Minister Shri.Conrad K. Sangma was read out by Shri B.C.Marak MCS.

There were also various skit and song presentations by various cultural troupes.

Vote of thanks was given by Shri Pravin Bakshi IAS, Commissioner and Secretary, Social Welfare Dept Govt. of Meghalaya.

The event was concluded by the performance of the National Anthem by the Brass Band of Meghalaya Home Guards.

The gender digital divide in connectivity, devices and use, skills and jobs is real.

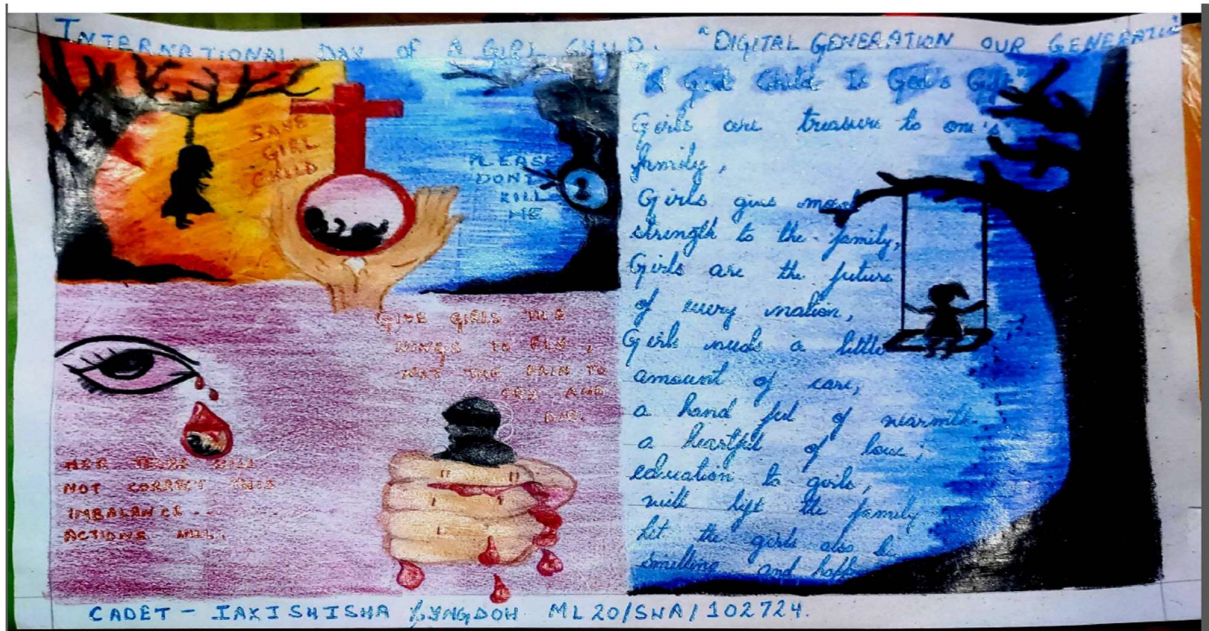
It is an inequity and exclusion gap across geographies and generations that is our challenge to address if the digital revolution is to be for all, with all, by all.

Date: October 2, 2021

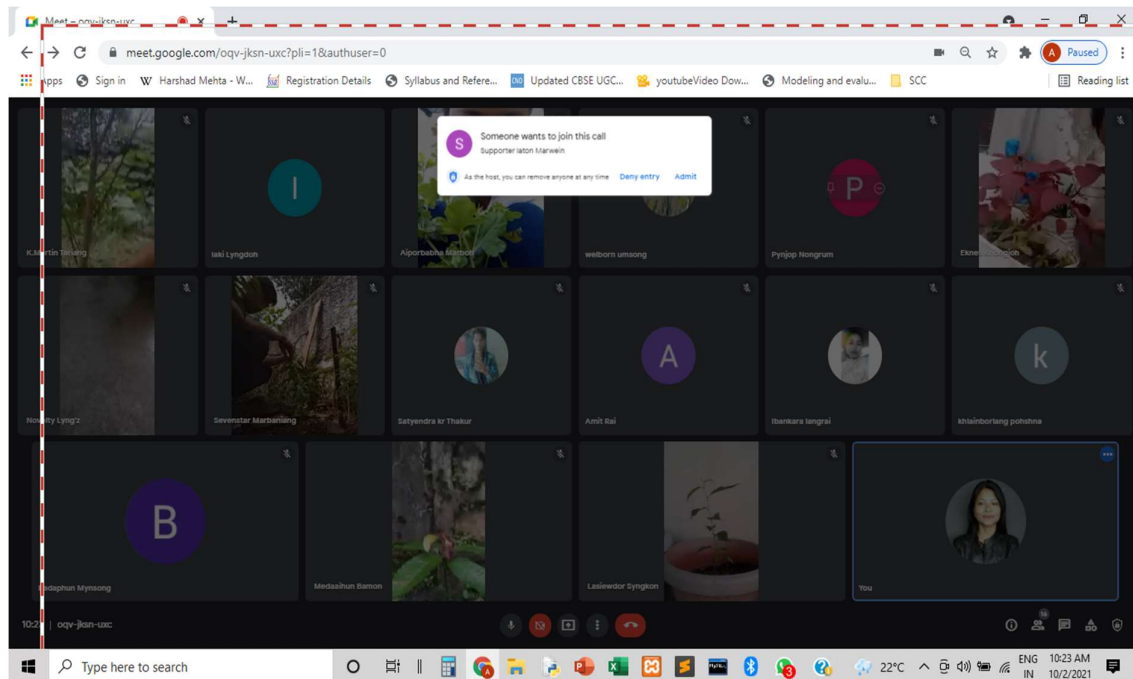

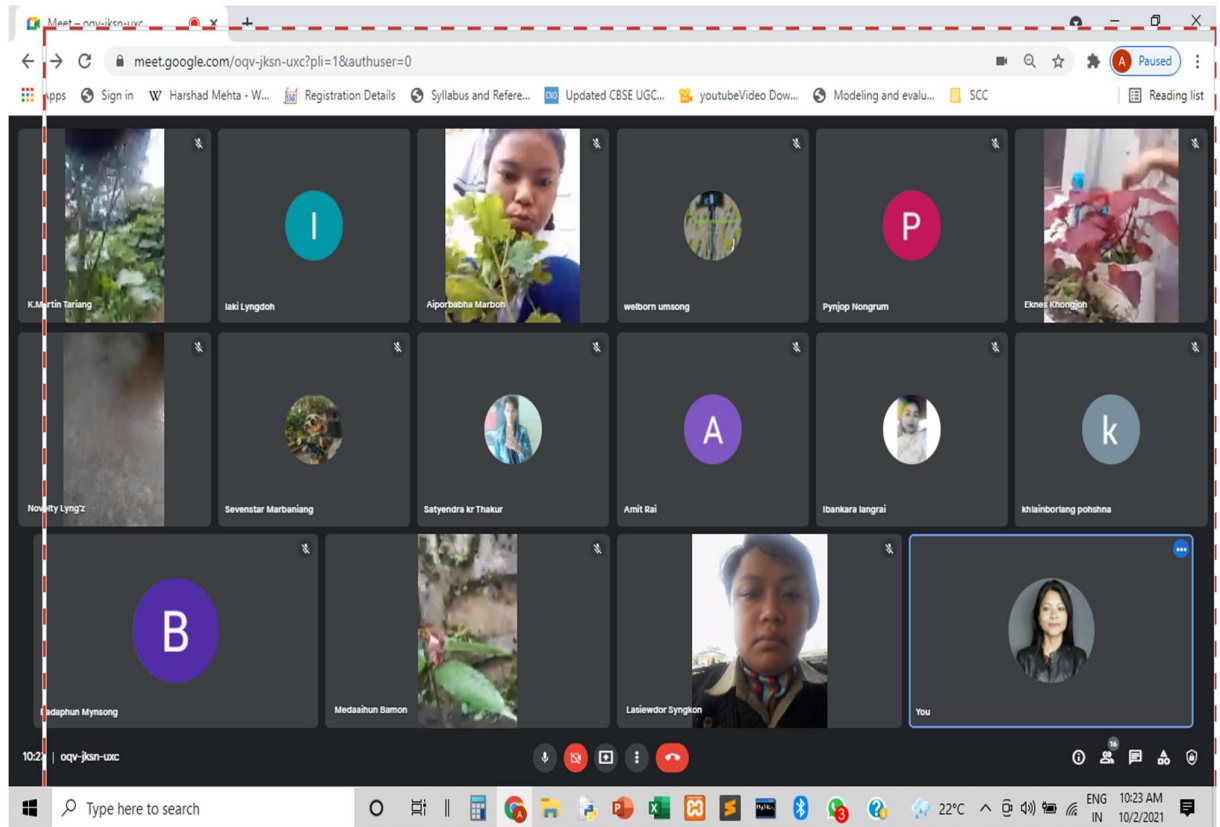
