As part of Spreading Quality Knowledge the College along with NSS, Alumni Association of the College, has taken an initiatives of conducting a one day 'Literacy Awareness Programme' on 21st March 2017. The Programme was a great success wherein The Vice Principal along with MDC of Sohryngkham, Staff and Few of the students visited 7 Lower Primary School comprising of Mawlyngad Pres. L.P School, St Mary's Mazzarello L.P. School, St John Bosco's Secondary School, Mawshbuit Presbyterian School, St Rose's School, Umpling Presbyterian School, St Agnes School Mawlynrei.





Children need to experience reading and writing as something that is connected to them and meaningful for them so therefore in each School we had a talk with the students of Classes One to Five motivating them to work harder and to be regular to school. We also had a chance to meet some of the parents of the students briefing them about the importance of education as active involvement of the parents is very crucial. Since the school we visited are in rural areas and the students are mostly from weaker sections so in connection to our programme and to encourage them to study hard and to ensure effective learning the College distributed some items such as Globe, Dictionary, Outline Maps of the World and India to each School. Each student was given Copies, Pencil, Rubber, Sharpener, Ruler, Crayon, Sketch Pen, Cursive Writing and Drawing books that will help them in writing and reading.

It was a great initiative adopted by the college to conduct such kind of programme in order to develop a sustainable education for any child; because Children should be given awareness right from their primary schooling.

### A Report on Soft skills Training

### **Conducted by Polaris Solutions Enterprise**

The program was designed to provide Soft skills training to the Final Year Students of Shillong Commerce College. ### REPORT OF LIBRARY ADVISORY COMMETTEE OF SHILLONG COMMERCE COLLEGE FOR THE ACADEMIC YEAR 2017.

During the Academic year 2017, the college library added a number of titles totaling 107 reference books, 158 general books and thereby taking the total number of Books in the college library to 8654. Presently the library is subscribing to 12 journals 9 daily newspapers 10 magazines besides 3 e-journals and subscribes to N-LIST of INFLIBNET.

In order to enhance the quality of services rendered by the library, a kiosk has been installed in the library. The kiosk will help library users to find out the availability and status of books in the library.

An 8 channel CCTV has been installed in the college Library since August 2017. An open access system has been implemented in the college library. 8 Desktops are used in the library for Record Maintenance while another set of 8 desktops are kept for use by students to access Internet which is exclusively for downloading study materials only. Bar Coding of books has also been started from this year. Open Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) has been implemented since May 2017.

A noteworthy change in the library has been deputation of interns from NEHU Library and Information Science Department to the college for a period of 2(two) months. This has helped the library in getting more organized and efficient.



### A Report on Social works Committee.

The Social Works Committee along with NSS of Shillong Commerce College observed World Environment Day on 5th June 2017(Monday) by organizing awareness Talk on preservation of environment and how one can reduce pollution at an individual level. The day long programme also included Cleaning Drive inside the college campus and the surrounding areas and roadside in front of the college.

On the occasion tree saplings (sourced from Central Nursery, Social Forestry, Govt. of Meghalaya Shillong) were planted in the campus. ## Report on the Voluntary Blood Donation Camp

The Principal explained the students about the need and the importance of donating their Blood. Dr. R Allya briefed more about the need of Blood Donation. She further explained the students about the different types of Blood Donors, The different diseases that spreads

through blood transfusion. She also mentioned the importance of the Guidelines that a Donor has to follow before and after the Donation.

After the conclusion of the first session, the second session was taken full charge by the staff and the Doctors from the Blood bank with little help from the volunteers from the college.

The procedure begins with the filling up of confidential registration form by student who volunteers to donate. The question was then re-evaluated by the staff to check if a donor is eligible or not. The blood test was then conducted to check for



hemoglobin and any other matters if exist. Though as many as 60 students registered, but most of them were rejected as few were underage, few had recently donated, few were not in a very good health. A Total of 21students out of which 4 cadets had donated their blood in the process of saving more life.

After the transfusion, donors were given fruits, health drinks, egg, a T-shirt and Certificate and were advised to rest and not to carry out any heavy activities at least for the day.
